

Cost & Registration:

Cost—\$2250* per person and includes flight, in country expenses and program fees. This does not include passport fees, vaccinations, or lunch.

A \$200 non-refundable, non-transferable deposit is due at the time of registration.

*A 3.5% fee will be added if paying by credit card.

Fundraising Opportunities & Scholarships:

There are two different fundraising opportunities for youth or families participating in this mission trip.

Butter Braid selling materials can be picked up on Sunday, February 3 at the Camp Sunday table, or in the Incarnation Office. Selling forms and money are due to the Incarnation Office on Monday, March 4 by 4:30 p.m. Butter Braids will be delivered on Thursday, March 28 around 4:00 p.m.

“Wall O’ Money” Fundraiser - people from the congregation would have the opportunity to “purchase” an envelope ranging from \$1 to \$150. They would then take the envelope and return it with the donation amount equal to the amount on the outside of the envelope. Make a Difference:

Our mission trips make a real, tangible difference in the lives of those we serve. The objective of each trip varies based on the needs of our ministries and mission partners in Haiti. We work at schools, orphanages, homes for the elderly and disabled, and hospitals. Most importantly, we share the Gospel by being Christ's hands and feet through our service to the poorest of the poor.

Leave Your Comfort Zone:

Mission work is intense. You will be required to leave the comfort of your everyday life and embrace unfamiliar places and situations. The experience will challenge your worldview and cause you to examine your heart and priorities. At the same time, you will learn from Haiti's vast history and beautiful culture. You will discover that the mission week is a period of enormous personal growth and development.

Service Experiences:

- Delivering clean water in Cite Soleil
- Serving at a home for sick and dying babies
- Caring for elderly at the Village of Jesus in Leogane or Sacred Heart home for the elderly in Port au Prince
- Caring for disabled children and adults at the Missionaries of the Poor
- Visiting children and young adults at Reiser Heights, Terre Promise, Guardian Angels, and Delmas Professional Trade School
- Learn about how Feed My Starving Children is helping the people of Haiti.

How will we get there?

We will be flying from MSP to PAP with Delta. Our flights will leave early in the morning on June 24 and will return late at night on July 1. You are responsible for transportation to and from the airport.

In Country Details:

Is Haiti Safe: Overall Haitians are friendly and peaceful people, however, there are risks associated with any international travel. Team members in Haiti are required to follow strict rules to minimize risk and we take every precaution possible to keep you safe. The guesthouse where we sleep has a high security wall topped with barbed wire and 24 hour security.

How will we travel around Haiti? We will ride in a "tap tap." This Haitian version of a bus allows for open air viewing of the city and sites while we travel. Many roads in Haiti are extremely rough and you will be bounced around.

Where do we Stay? We stay in guesthouses in Port Au Prince with security walls. There are air-conditioned bedrooms with bunk beds, pillows and blankets. Bathrooms have showers and flushing toilets. We eat family style in a dining room.

What kind of food will we eat? Haitian staff at the guesthouse prepares breakfast and dinner. We will eat mostly American style food (like pancakes, French toast, tacos and spaghetti) and some traditional Haitian food including rice and beans, plantain and vegetables.

Team members buy snacks in the US and carry them to Haiti in our luggage. We eat snacks while on the go for lunch and share all of our food. Typical items are beef sticks, granola bars, nuts, dried fruit, and crackers. Please don't bring anything containing chocolate. It will melt! If you have special dietary needs you are welcome to bring your own food. Haitian staff members cook our meals in the kitchen.

We provide you with purified Culligan water to drink while out in the field and at the guesthouse. It is not safe to drink tap water.

Pre-trip expectations for those going to Haiti:

There will be two pre-trip gatherings where the focus will be getting to know one another, learning about what we will be doing in Haiti and learning more about the people and culture of Haiti. There will also be a "packing party" the week prior to our departure where we will pack group supplies for our trip.
