What has been clarifying is this: The people who had the hardest time with Jesus' message aren't atheists or agnostics or practitioners of other faiths. The people who are most offended are the most religious, the most well-positioned spiritual leaders, the ones who seem most certain they understand what God is all about.

I wonder, sometimes, if I would have been similarly offended by his surprising and radical grace.

I wonder, sometimes, how willing I am to "follow" his lead today.

Yet, however challenging and clarifying the message has been, and is now, I have also been made more curious about what it would be like to live his message today.

Last Sunday, I presented a list of tensions between the world as it is and the world Jesus imagines. They included:

- Consumers vs. Caretakers of Creation
- Greed vs. Generosity

- Competition vs. Compassion
- Selfishness vs. Selflessness
- Violence vs. Shalom
- Fear vs. Love

It should be evident which describes the way the world as it, too often, is and which describes the world Jesus imagines.

But, let me say a few things about those binary choices:

It's never as simple as either/or. We live in the tension of both sides every day, every decision.

Jesus' vision is hard. As in the story of the Good Samaritan, it's easier to walk on by than to respond with mercy. Even so, that we can't easily and fully live into Jesus' vision is no excuse for apathy.

Change, in our lives and in the world, won't happen by simply thinking or hoping it will. It happens through intentional, gradual, consistent, practice of the better.

Luke's Gospel (and the second edition of it, The Book of Acts) reminds us that change is possible!

As I often say, "Jesus didn't come to help us build bigger and better churches; Jesus came to help us imagine and then co-create a better, more loving world."

What has been challenging for you in this message? Clarifying? Where do you find yourself being called to make a difference?

We also appreciate the special focus each year (e.g. Planting Hope campaign in 2023, ELCA World Hunger's 50th Year in 2024) and visiting the Mission Fair booths.



Rosalie and Ken: Worshiping with our brothers and sisters in the synod; sisiting the many booths that shared the work of the synod and ELCA; welcoming Eternal Flame congregation — a new congregation made up mostly of Hmong immigrants, the first new synod congregation in the last 10 years; Recognition of the opening of the East Side School after large donations from Incarnation



and other synod congregations; renewing our faith with hope, as Bishop Lull shared the good things happening in the synod; realizing that we are not alone in our faith.

Vernita: It's all about the gathered body of Lutheran Christians in our geographical area. It's about worshipping together in larger numbers with raised voices, excellent music, excellent preaching (Bishop Lull is always good), and sharing the gift of Holy Communion with other congregation members. It's about being "church together" as voting members. We come to that responsibility not representing ourselves or our congregations but as voters on behalf of all the members of the Saint Paul Area Synod. We vote to elect leadership, to adopt a budget for the synod's work, to joyfully welcome new congregations (Holy Flame this year), and to discuss and vote upon resolutions and memorials. It's also a connection to the churchwide ELCA; learning from the churchwide representative about what's happening in the ELCA and beyond.

Today's Topic: Single-Use Plastic

Our oceans and landfills are drowning in single-use plastics. Single-use plastic products are made from fossil fuels and include plastic and polystyrene food and beverage containers, bottles, straws, cups, cutlery, and disposable plastic bags designed for or intended to be used once and discarded. The majority of singleuse plastics are never recycled, and they take 1,000 years to break down in a landfill. Single-use plastics leach chemicals and microplastics that are harmful to humans and wildlife.

What can we do?

Be mindful of how much single-use plastic you bring into your house. There are many easy ways to reduce our use of such products.

- Reusable grocery and produce bags are a great first step. Many stores sell reusable produce bags in different sizes to help avoid using plastic bags for our apples and avocados. Keep your bags in the car so they are always with you whenever you make a stop.
- Cleaning products are a huge source of single-use plastic from laundry detergent to dishwashing soap. There are many options for products that do not come in single-use plastic. Seventh Generation, Grove Collaborative, Blueland, TruEarth, Dropps, and Earth Breeze are just a few of the many brands offering various sustainable products, and they take up much less room in your cupboard!

Finance Report

June was an excellent month for Incarnation. The budget for income was \$189,542 and the actual income was \$219, 682. Thank you for your generosity! Thank you, also for supporting the high school students going to the ELCA Gathing in New Orleans. There was extra income in June that helped pay for expenses.

Expenses continue to be under budget. June budgeted expense was \$198,449. Actual expenses were \$167,013. Part of these savings comes from having two empty staff positions. For the year ending June 30, we received \$1,159,701 in income. The budget for this period is \$1,298,876.

For the year ending June 30, we have had \$1,142,562 in expenses. The budget for this period is \$1,282,020.

Please continue to give throughout the summer so that we will be ready to begin the program year with a healthy budget in September. We are thrilled to enter our second year of hosting blood drives in our community! Please join us for our fifth quarterly blood drive at Incarnation if you're able. 
Solid Ground Coat Drive

Primary Election Day is Tuesday, August 13

One of the rights we have as citizens is the right to vote. This includes voting in local, state, and federal primary and general elections. A primary election determines which candidates will be on the ballot in the November general election.

You can vote in person on Election Day, Tuesday, August 13 OR you can vote by mail or in person June 28-August 12. The important thing to do is TO VOTE!

There may be two kinds of offices on your primary ballot: partisan offices and nonpartisan offices.


Partisan offices will list a political party next to a candidate's name on the ballot. All state and federal offices—such as U.S. representative or Minnesota

senator—are partisan offices. You can only vote for candidates from one political party. If you vote for candidates from more than one political party, your votes will not count. You decide when you vote which one of the parties you will vote for.

Nonpartisan offices will not list a political party next to a candidate's name on the ballot. For example, county, city, township and school board offices are nonpartisan. Nonpartisan offices will be listed on the back side of the ballot. You can vote for any candidate. The candidates receiving the most votes will be on the November general election ballot.
