
seek? What practices do you pursue?"

The responses ranged from quizzical looks to taking my day off each week to reading good books to self-care to "I can't say I have much of an inner journey." Were these pastors "productive"? From what I know, yes. Could they list multiple acts of service they were involved in? For sure. But, the concept of the inner journey was a bit elusive for many.

As we are building our three-year plan, the two core pillars are reflections of the inward journey (Deepening Faith) and the outward journey (Serving and Transforming Community). As a reminder, the inward journey consists of practices and experiences that allow us to discover how deeply we are loved by God. The outward journey is discovering how God is asking us to help cocreate a better, more loving world.

The inward journey, alone, can become deeply selfish. The outward journey, alone, can become a breeding ground for self-righteousness (no one serves like I do) or judgment of others or burnout. We need the energy and assurance of the inward journey so we can be strengthened and encouraged for the outward journey.

This summer, as we search for a Pastor for Adult Formation, we will be looking for someone who takes the inward/outward journey seriously in their own life and someone who wants to invite this community, across all ages, into a deeper experience of God's presence and life. The same will be true in our search for a Faith Formation Leader for Children's Ministry.



So, here's the invitation:

- Pay attention to and develop more fully your own inward/outward journey practices.
- Keep praying for those new leaders to emerge who will lead us in years to come and for the teams who will make the decisions.
- If you have time, ask, "How can I help in this time of transition?"





We also launched two new handbell ensembles, Grace Notes for grades 1-5, and Prime Chimers, a nonperforming group. Along with the already-existing Bells of Praise (grades 5-12) and Alleluia Ringers (adults and experienced high school ringers), we had over 40 people ringing handbells and handchimes this year. That brings me joy! I hope you were able to hear three of our ensembles ringing "Jesus Loves Me" together on Mother's Day. It was beautiful.

Due to high parental demand, we were able to successfully relaunch our children's choir, Joyful Noise, under the direction of Kathleen Johnson. She will tell you more about their year, and I will add that having a children's choir leading in worship again was a delight.

In 2022, children began attending the first part of worship along with their caregivers. The Worship Planning Team identified 12 hymns as essential to the faith journey, and we intentionally sang those 12 hymns each week for a year. We continue to add new hymns to this list and are now up to 28! Singing together is so important in fostering unity, congregational engagement, and shared experiences in worship. 

Fire and Ashes: A Boy and an African Proverb By: Ahmed Hassan and Wes Erwin



The cover alone of this book will draw you in! Why is that young boy blowing the feather? Where will it go and will he follow? The illustrations of the Somali family and Warfu's struggle to find himself in a new place and a new school are beautiful and compelling. His story is like that of many immigrant children; our schools, communities, and country are their homes now and we are called to understand their challenges and adjustments.

This title is the first in a planned series of children's books that will focus on mental health and self-care by featuring the wisdom found in African proverbs. Proverbs are handed down for generations and help children understand in often very visual ways. Here Warfu makes choices, takes action, and overcomes his challenges.

The co-authors, Ahmed Hassan and Wes Erwin, are both counselors who work with immigrants and refugees. Both live in Shoreview — and might be your neighbors or your scout leaders!

Preschool Book Drive Total

Thanks to the generosity of Preschool families and the congregation, we were able to donate 940 books to <u>The Free Book Buggie</u>! Thank you for helping get books into the hands of children and youth across Minnesota!

All Hands on Hope MobilePack™

For five days in April, Incarnation hosted more than 2,200 volunteers during our All Hands on Hope MobilePack[™]. During that time, we achieved our goal of packing 614,304 meals to feed 1,683 of God's hungry kids one meal per day for a year. We also had a goal of raising \$180,000 to pay for the meals we packed, and as of April 30, we have raised over \$202,000! We will use any financial overages to partially replenish seed money for our next MobilePack[™].

One of the best things about the MobilePack is how many people we welcomed into our church building. Overall, 62% of the volunteers came from outside Incarnation's community. On Saturday's full shifts, a whopping 80% of volunteers were from outside Incarnation's walls. We are truly blessed to have welcomed so many people from different groups into our facility as we share the common goal to feed God's hungry children.

Examples of groups we hosted include area churches including Catholic, Hmong, Mormon and other denominations, as well as sports teams, Rotary, Kiwanis, local businesses, engineering students from the University of Minnesota, scout troops, senior living communities, retired teachers organizations, and National Honor Society students.

One volunteer, Ywahay Say, first heard about the All Hands on Hope MobilePack[™] via our social media channels. She volunteered at the 2023 MobilePack[™] and returned this year, bringing a group of 16 young people from the Karen (pronounced Kuh-Ren) Christian Fellowship Church. She is from the country of Myanmar (formerly Burma), and her family moved to the United States in 2015 due to the persecution of the Myanmar military. Prior to that, her family lived in a refugee camp in Thailand

for 10 years. Myanmar is one of the countries which <u>Feed My Starving</u> <u>Children</u> serves, often shipping meals to bordering Thailand and then delivering into Myanmar.

According to the International Rescue Committee (IRC),

"Myanmar has endured prolonged conflict for decades, predominantly in rural regions, pitting government forces against nonstate armed groups primarily organized along ethnic lines. The convergence of escalating poverty, movement restrictions, inflation, disruption of markets, climate shocks, and conflict has plunged 15.2 million individuals in Myanmar into varying degrees of food insecurity, ranging from moderate to severe."

Ywahay said, "While I was packing (meals), my heart and thoughts were going to people who will receive the food. I was not sure which area of Myanmar the food will go to, I believe the children there will receive it. Working alongside our youth and seeing their eagerness to contribute was truly heartwarming and it was a remarkable experience."

Thank you to everyone who made this incredible event possible. We are already looking forward to the 2025 All Hands on Hope MobilePack[™], scheduled for April 30 – May 4, 2025!
