I am a gracious and skilled worship leader and musician, working well with people of all ages and abilities.

I have a Doctor of Ministry in practical theology: Faith formation... I am especially interested in working with colleagues, congregation members, and those we touch in our daily lives to develop sustainable faith practices in daily life."

Finally, when she was asked about the setting that would make best use of her gifts, she responded, I would be energized in a place where people want to have conversations that matter; are willing to do the sometimes difficult, sometimes joyful work to build community; are hospitable and generous people looking to share their gifts with their neighbors.

The Call Team was not only convinced Pastor Joy would fit well within our "church without walls" mindset, but she will also expand our vision of what it means to follow a gracious and loving God into the world, each day.

Remember, once we let Pastor Joy settle in, we will begin the process of *Building for Our Future* with the addition of staffing for seniors (retirement and beyond) and Young Adults (20s–30s), both critical ministries for our present and future.

As we close the year, we want to continue our generous ways so that we can be ready to launch these new ministries in 2025. To that end, there are three commitments we want you to consider as we plan for 2025 and beyond.

Building for Our Future: If you haven't already made your commitment, there is still time.
 Though we have \$2.6 million in commitments we will need \$750,000 to \$1,000,000 more to complete the ministry we have planned through 2026. Commitment cards are available at the Welcome Center or you can commit online at https://www.incarnationmn.org/give/building-for-our-future/

- Operating Fund: This supports our daily ministry and outreach, our staffing, and ongoing facility needs. This is the "bread and butter" so to speak. I've been so encouraged by the transformation and enthusiasm that is being experienced by many at Incarnation. With our new staffing next year, I anticipate an even more expansive work of God's Spirit in you and through you to our larger community.
- *Mortgage Fund:* Our remaining debt on the building is currently at \$1,750,329.38. You can also make specific commitments to help us pay down the mortgage.

What a season. We celebrate the present. We prepare for the future. And all of it, guided and directed by the loving Spirit of Jesus.

I'm grateful to welcome new members joining our community and interact with visitors who are joining us for the first time. I'm grateful for all of the programs that help our children and young adults grow in their faith. I'm grateful for the expansion of programs we aspire to in our Three-Year Plan and the generosity of our congregation in committing to our Building for Our Future campaign to make those aspirations a reality.

I'm grateful for the tremendous team effort that makes our Incarnation community what it is. This month, I will close with an added 'thank you' to one of the many groups that work diligently behind the scenes. Recently our Incarnation Woodworkers Group completed the "Welcome to Incarnation" sign you now see in the Atrium next to the Mobile Welcome Kiosk (which they also made). In connecting with Dick Trapp and Ken Grosch, both members of the group, I learned the group has been together for many years with various participants over that tenure. Their monthly email update is distributed to approximately 50 woodworkers and any given month, up to a dozen or so members may be engaged on projects.

The group initially came together to learn more about woodworking from one another. As awareness of their talents increased, they were asked to consider various projects for the church. Their handiwork is on display throughout our facility. They've completed approximately 40 projects over the years, including several in the Library, Chapel, youth rooms and nursery, and many throughout the Sanctuary and Atrium. Several years ago, they also provided 300+crosses for congregation members (the picture below is the one I received at that time).


Second, you can purchase any items from the "Holiday Baking Bag Drive" list and drop them off at Incarnation or RRFS:



Does this term have much meaning for today? Do we make things "from scratch" in our kitchens now or do we pop a ready-made in the oven, open a box mix for brownies, or order in/eat out? Remember when meals were made "from scratch?" Didn't the food shared then taste better and wasn't it healthier?

Several of us from Incarnation had the joy of sharing "From Scratch" food at the annual gathering and fundraiser for Shobi's Table. We enjoyed tasty food like lemon roasted chicken, seasonal roasted vegetables, garlic focaccia bread sticks, and sticky toffee date cake - the same kinds of food made from scratch and served by the big blue mobile food truck four days per week on a "Pay as you can" basis at four sites in St. Paul.

We learned that the number of weekly meals increased in the past year from 4,600 to 9,000! At the same time, the cost of a single meal has decreased from \$1.66 to \$1.55, even including the cost of compostable dishes. We heard these amazing statistics and even more amazing stories from those who benefit from the opportunity to have a "place at the table".

You, too, can share in making love edible and sharing a taste of "the feast to come". Join others from Incarnation who volunteer (food preparation, serving, etc.), who come to purchase/share lunch (the closest site is Lexington and Larpenteur on Wednesdays), who help spread the story of Shobi's Table, who hire Shobi's to cater a meal for an event, or who generously contribute financially in support. Be involved to join in celebrating a just and merciful world where all have access to good food and a vibrant community.

Creation Care Projects at Incarnation

As the newly formed Creation Care Action Group works to get organized, it seems appropriate to share the good work many people have already been doing. One of the larger projects has been working on a proposal for solar panels at Incarnation. The solar committee has worked to research the best

types of installation for our facility, to interview solar vendors for the best possible materials, investment, and protections, and worked with the council on incorporating such a project into our long-range strategic plan.

Efforts continue to make our facility a more green and environmentally friendly building.

Look for the recently installed bins for recyclable materials around the building.

The recent Block Party event in September was almost 100% Zero Waste, using compostable food service and delivering the compostable trash to the nearby Shoreview compost site. Work to transition from harmful Styrofoam food service items to more compostable items in all our hospitality events continues. Energy-saving LED lights have been installed in many places around the building and parking lot.

An effort to revitalize and restore

the Rain Garden in the southeast corner of our property has begun. Work to remove invasive species and dead trees, prune existing plants, add plantings to nurture pollinators (see the Living Lutheran resource below for more on pollinators), and repair seating areas has begun.

Many members of the Incarnation community are active in several organizations including the

St. Paul Area Synod Care of Creation Team, Lutherans Restoring Creation, and Blessed Tomorrow, a coalition of religious partners working to advance climate solutions. Education about the climate crisis continues with small group offerings, documentary movie viewings as well as several great resources in our library.

The climate crisis can be overwhelming and so large that it seems the actions of any one person will not

stated in the ELCA Social Statement on Climate Crisis "In the Holy Scriptures, God assigns a sacred

responsibility to human beings: we are to care for and keep God's creation for future generations." The Incarnation community takes this responsibility very seriously. We all have a role in preserving our earth for generations to come.



Who Am I and Why Do I Matter By Chris Morphew

Chris Morphew has authored a series of "Big Question" titles for youth, answering some of the main questions that young people wrestle with today (and have likely always done so.) His latest title, *Who Am I and Why Do I Matter*, refers back to Scripture and uses examples from the Bible reminding youth that we are all made in God's image. He further shows that we have worth just because we are made in God's image and that we are called to follow Jesus. He uses the hope of the gospel to further the understanding that past mistakes don't define either current self-worth or the future

Morphew never talks down to young readers. They will find this title an answer to one of their big questions. And make your conversations with them easier, too.

Ordinary Blessings for Parents: Prayers, Poems and Meditations for Family Life By Meta Herrick Carlson

Our church library already had a copy of Meta Herrick Carlson's *Ordinary Blessing: Prayers, Poems and Blessings for Ordinary Life* so when we read a review of this new book by her in Living Lutheran magazine, we knew it would make a good addition to our collection. We think you will agree.

Carlson writes this collection of blessings, especially for caregivers of children, those adults who bear witness and show up for the ordinary things about family life - - often adults who are not biological parents but care deeply for children. All the blessings are meant to honor God's interest in the very ordinary things of life and celebrate that. The blessings range from those for beginning parenthood, through birthing, the first year, little bodies, big feelings, first and transitions, for life together, and for an inheritance. You will find that the nearly 150 blessings, although often brief, have a lot to say. Who will not read the "Blessing for Losing a Tooth" or the one for "Picky Eaters"?

On Sunday, November 3, we are observing All Saints Day and will remember those who have gone before us and light candles in their memory.


Both worship services will be identical with beautiful music selections for that day. We hope you can join us!
