At the end of one of my early conversations for *Building for Our Future*, I was thanking the couple for taking the time to talk about how they could financially support our future when one of them responded, "It's about time. We've been waiting for a chance like this to give to our future."

What a gift. What a heart.

My role as Senior Pastor has many organizational leadership responsibilities. I get to oversee the systems and processes by which we do our ministry together. But, my primary responsibility is focused on the spiritual vision and health of this community. At this point in our history our vision includes:

We long to:

• Fill the world with God's grace and love.

We strive to:

• Learn to live and love like Jesus, for a lifetime.

We hope to:

• Imagine and then co-create a better, more loving world.

For that to happen, we need to imagine all of whom we are—our time, our energy, our passions, our creativity, and our money, being directed toward Jesus' vision for this world. They are all gifts from God and ways we can offer ourselves to the world.

It's also true, in a money-obsessed culture, that how we think about and use financial resources are a reflection of where we are on our spiritual journey. So, at Incarnation, we don't shy away from talking about money as an essential component of our lives of faith, not to make anyone feel guilty or burdened, but because what we do with our money, like the other parts of our lives, is a deeply spiritual response to God's first gift of life. Think of how this was echoed in that earlier conversation, "It's about time. We've been waiting for a chance like this to give to our future."

I'm not sure how you regard the connection between your money and your life of faith. Is it energizing? Does it feel burdensome? Do you think about it at all?

Because it's an important component of our faith journey, if you are interested in growing in your sense of generosity, here is a process that I have found to be helpful:

- *Start giving:* Do it simply. Do it one time and then find a way to do it again.
- *Give consistently:* Start to consciously look for ways to give. At this phase, don't worry about the amount. Simply look for ways to give consistently so you develop a "habit of giving." Anything we do habitually, over time, becomes who we are!
- *Give until you notice:* Many of us can offer a financial gift without even noticing it. But, when you give until you notice, you start making decisions about what the most important things are in your life. What gives your life the most meaning?
- *Give generously:* The biblical notion of the tithe (10%) is a starting point. But, generosity is never bound by a number, in money or time.

• *Give as a way of life:* Over time, you won't be waiting for others to give you opportunities to give. You will think about it in every aspect of your life. What do I have to offer my family today? My community? My neighbor? The stranger in need?

Wherever you are on this path, know this, we respect where you are. Be there. Know God loves you where you are!

But, when you want to grow in your generosity, think about what a simple next step would be. No guilt. Just grace. Look at the process and take a step.

This fall, you will be invited to consider three opportunities to give as we plan for our 2025 ministry. We hope you understand that, as leaders and staff, we believe God is inviting us to extend our ministry at Incarnation because we want:

- To be filled with God's love and grace.
- To learn to live and live like Jesus, for a lifetime.
- To become co-creators of a better, more loving world.

Here is how that will happen for us:

- *Building for Our Future* Appeal: (if you haven't already made a commitment) This appeal begins now and extends through December 2026. The appeal funds:
 - Staffing for young adults and seniors
 - Support and expansion of our Outreach Ministry Partners
 - Facility upgrades that will help us become a sought-after facility for our community.
- Operating Budget: The everyday life of our congregation that supports our ministry of worship, small groups, learning for all ages, and our ordinary facility maintenance.
- Mortgage: The paydown of our mortgage debt.

Friends, remember: If you've been waiting for a chance to give for our future. Now is the time.

In the end, no guilt. Just grace. Let's see what good things God is going to work in our lives and in our community, together.

Seeing the smiles on young faces after they've experienced ILC Kids, sharing information on upcoming small groups and the Kairos series, providing the Looking Inward, Living Outward book that accompanies our Fall worship series, and telling newcomers about Incarnation, are just a few of the connections I've enjoyed. Another benefit is hearing the questions and suggestions I can bring back to the Council and our Communication Committee. One topic I was recently asked about was the Incarnation Endowment Fund. Sharing information on the Endowment Fund is very timely as we are currently recruiting for openings on the Endowment Fund Committee as part of our annual nominating process. We're also recruiting for our Incarnation Synod Representatives (featured in the August Lifetimes) and Congregation Council Members (featured in the September Lifetimes). All three roles provide opportunities to connect with others, learn more about our faith community, and support important initiatives. All while having fun too!

To provide more insights on the Endowment Fund, I reached out to Mark Tollander who chairs the committee. Mark, thank you for serving on the committee and providing your insights.

The primary purpose of the Incarnation Endowment Fund is to provide funding for causes that foster innovation and leadership. This focus supports the mission and vision of Incarnation and the broader church, to help ensure vitality for both in the years to

come. Complementing Incarnation's "church without walls" emphasis, this includes two primary areas of funding:

Budding Idea Grants: The "BIG" program was established in 2020 to fund community outreach initiatives that support the mission and values of Incarnation Lutheran Church. Examples of BIGfunded projects include a Music Grant Program, the Friday Night Block Party, and a selected Eagle Scout Project among others.

Leaders Growing Leaders: Encompasses funding the exploration and launch of initiatives to identify future leaders, who strive to make a difference in this world through leadership in ministry or other service careers. One example is Incarnation's Summer Student Internship Program for young adults which launched in 2021.

The Endowment Fund Committee meets on a quarterly basis and currently has 6 members, along with Pastor Kai. The Committee may also engage in periodic meetings with applicants for a Budding Idea Grant. A recent example included meeting with leaders from Shobi's Table earlier this year to better understand their grant request which was later approved.

"For me personally, being part of our Incarnation Endowment Team helps me feel more connected to this community. Attending the Block Party last month, attending Church on Sunday, playing Pickleball with fellow Incarnation members; these all allow me to feel connected to others and my community, which is important to me and an important part of my faith journey."

> October 6: Interfaith Literacy

Jen Kilps, Network Executive for the Minnesota Multifaith Network



It is fear of the "other" or the unknown that keeps us from welcoming our neighbor. Religious literacy is a key component to breaking down that fear by helping us to understand the religious traditions of people in our community — how they are similar and different to our own and how we can work together for the common good.

Kilps considers interfaith education her vocation. She has worked for the Lutheran Office for Public Policy in WI, Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Minnesota Council of Churches, and national Church World Service refugee services and resettlement programs. She focused on hospitality in her doctorate in theology from the Centre for the Study of Religion and Politics at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland.

October 13: Reading the Bible Like Grownups

Anna Marsh, Visiting Assistant Professor of Old Testament, Luther Seminary



Encounters with classic stories from the Bible began when we were children, reading stories of heroes and villains, talking animals, and miraculous surprises. Moreover, these stories tended to have clear lines, straightforward lessons, and happy endings and shaped our imagination about what it means to be a child of God and a member of a faith community.

But as we grow and our lives become more complex, so too should the way we read the Bible. In this two-week series, revisit some familiar stories from the Bible and read them with "grownup glasses," finding new avenues to explore and new possibilities for how the Bible can engage our imagination.

Marsh, a graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College a Luther Seminary, served on the St. Paul Area Synod staff while completing her doctoral studies at the Jewish Theological Seminary.

October 27: What Did Martin Luther Think He Was Doing?

Mark Granquist, Lloyd and Annelotte Svendsbye Professor of the History of Christianity, Luther Seminary



Lutherans, and all Protestant Christians, trace the beginning of their Christian traditions back to the actions of a single 16th-century person, Martin Luther. So in those fateful years leading up to the Protestant Reformation, what did Luther intend to do – literally, what was he thinking? Granquist is the author of many books and articles on the history of Lutheranism.





Today's topic: For Every Generation

Recently Pastor Kai focused on a question from Joshua 4 "What will we tell the next generations about how God was working through us in our time?", and the flip side of that same question "What will the next generation say about how God was active and alive

through us?" If we look at those questions through the lens of creation care we can ask "What will we tell the next generation about how God was working through us to care for and heal our natural world?" and "What will the next generation say about how God was active and alive through us in caring for the world now and for future generations?"

One sometimes divisive and controversial topic in our culture is the climate crisis. While debates can rage about the existence, causes and solutions to the climate crisis, what is not debatable is that many people are experiencing tremendous stress due to the evidence surrounding climate change. There are numerous studies showing the effects of climate anxiety on our teenagers and young adults around the world. Some young people feel humanity is doomed and a significant percentage state fears about the future of our world makes them reluctant to have children. While exact numbers can be debated, the overwhelming majority of the global scientific community believe that the current rate of climate change is largely due to human activity. As stewards of God's creation and as Christians caring for all of God's children, both now and in the future, how do we respond?

The ILC Creation Care Action Group seeks to raise these questions and to help us all take some sort of action. The topic can be overwhelming but there are concrete steps we can all take. There are many issues but there are also many solutions. It will take all of

us making changes large and small to make a

difference. The technology available right now for fighting climate change is amazing, from continuingly emerging battery technologies to new clean energy sources. Small things like reducing personal water use, consistent recycling and reducing your use of plastics can make a big impact. If we all raise our awareness and do something, no matter how small, the results will make a difference. We are

called by God to do nothing less, for ourselves and future generations.





Men's History Book Group
